

Jamboree Classes and Supply Lists

Applique the Apliquik Way

This is a wonderful method, especially good for small or skinny pieces, that can be used for both hand or machine applique. The class will provide a starter technique kit but you can choose your own project.

Supplies: Sewing machine and supplies, small iron and ironing mat, applique scissors, mono-filament thread or threads that match fabric.



Quilted Postcards

Kits will be made available at the class. The possibilities are endless – and a lot of fun. You will construct in the morning and then tack down with your machine in the afternoon.

Supplies: Basic sewing supplies only.



Jelly Roll Bargello



This Bargello quilt uses a jelly roll. You can choose either design. If you have Julie Curry's book bring it to class.

Supplies: Sewing machine, jelly roll, rotary cutter, cutting mat, long cutting ruler, small personal iron and ironing mat. Assorted sewing supplies.



Stack 'n' Whack Dresden Plates



Using a unique way to do stack 'n' whack quilts, you will end up with a beautiful and interesting quilt.

Supply list: Rotary cutter with new blade, cutting mat, sewing machine, acrylic quilting ruler, thread to match fabric. Template and heavy quilting thread will be provided.

Fabric for the plates: This is the most fun and the most frustrating part of the pattern. Choose a fabric that has a variety of elements in the fabric to make it different in each block. Florals work well as do fabrics with animals, fish, fruit, etc. Fabrics with a few different colors also add to this overall effect. Choose medium to large prints, small prints do not work well.

Once you have selected your fabric you need to determine how much to buy. You will need 12 repeats. Look along the selvedge edge until you see this same element again. Measure the distance between the first and second appearance of the element. This distance is the "repeat" of the pattern. You need to have 12 repeats for the blades of the plate. Repeats may be between 8" and 24". Multiply the distance in the repeat by 12. So if your repeat is 10", it would be a 10x12, or 120", or about three and a half yards. The larger your repeat, the more fabric you will need.

Note: do not buy background fabric at this time. You may change your mind once the plates are completed.
